In this course students will study the fundamental philosophies and organization of the US Government. Special emphasis will be placed on the concept of political power; what it is, who has it and how it is used. This course will also use government current events as a vehicle for understanding the key political issues facing our nation and state along with the role Media plays in our national political dialogue. We will also focus on why and how events happened, including who, when, and where. Students will see why events are important and what impact they have on the world today.

Students will incorporate technology by using their iPads to search for current events, resources, and online readings. The student will also learn to outline basic chapter facts. Information from class discussion, notes from the textbook and other primary sources will be assimilated to ensure understanding.

Assessments will be based upon the understanding of civil responsibilities, government working and concepts. In each chapter, a series of sections will be read, discussed and reviewed. Students will then have an action item known as "Citizenship Skills" and "Debating the Issues" which will require effort outside the class textbook. Afterwards, a quiz will be administered followed by a review game. Students will take a test or create a project for assessment of the material from the chapter.
