

8th Grade History Course Syllabus (American History from 1865)

Students will examine American History from 1865 by incorporating the other social sciences – political science, economics, sociology, psychology and law – into the learning process. Philosophy and literature will also be used in examining historical events.

Emphasis will be put on why and how events happened, including who, when, and where. Students will see why events are important and what impact they have on the world today.

Students will incorporate technology by using their iPads to access historical resources and online readings. The student will also learn to outline basic chapter facts. Information from class discussion, notes from the textbook and other primary sources will be assimilated to ensure understanding.

Assessments will be based upon the understanding of historical concepts and events. In each chapter, a series of sections will be read, discussed and reviewed. Afterwards, a quiz will be administered followed by a review game. Students will take a test or create a project for assessment of the material from the chapter.
